The Division of Information Technology will block all peer-to-peer applications traversing the University network destined for the internet starting in July, 2010. Using peer-to-peer applications to transmit any infringing copyrighted material violates Federal Law and the Acceptable Use Policy of Bridgewater State University and will result in University disciplinary actions as well as civil and criminal liabilities. If you have a legitimate academic or business need to use a peer-to-peer application please submit a ticket with the BSU HelpDesk at Ext. 2555 (508.531.2555 from off campus) or ITSupport@bridgew.edu.

In addition to University disciplinary actions, one who shares copyrighted materials with those on the internet may be subject to civil and criminal liabilities as well as penalties for violation of Federal Copyright Laws with fines pursuant to federal laws.

The University's effectiveness of its technology-based deterrent will be subject to periodic review and testing to ensure compliance with the Higher Education Opportunity Act (HEOA) (Public Law 110-315).
